#### B-HIGHLIGHTS OF PROJECT • **ACHIEVEMENTS FOR** 2016 **UNDER THEMATIC AREAS**

## B-1 promoting quality, availability and accessibility to health services

With support from Mild May RACOBAO lobbied the District Health Officer (DHO) to successfully conduct 5 outreaches in Kasagama, Kinuuka, and Kaliiro, Mpumudde and Lyakajura targeting young girls &young mothers. The community health outreaches enabled 434 (245 Females) to access the services.

On the other hand, with financial support from ABH, RACOBAO successfully implemented a project aimed at promoting quality, access and availability of health services in Sembabule and Mityana districts. The outcomes of RACOBAO's interventions include:

- Reduced absenteeism of health workers e.g. Chief Administrative Officers (CAOs) of both Sembabule and Mityana districts instituted a form in all public health centres and schools to reduce absenteeism.
- Increased staffing leading to improvement in service delivery
- Increased functionality of Health Management Committees i.e some new HUMCs selected and oriented on their roles e.g at Malangala, Maanyi, Ssekanyonyi, Kalanaalo, Kakindu Town council Mityana.
- Increased community awareness of the causes, effects and control measures for malaria particularly in Sembabule district.
- slight decline in drug stock outs at the health units since requisitions are made in time and submitted to ensure timely delivery

## **B-2** Child rights protection

With support from IDF, RACOBAO implemented a child rights protection project in Kasagama and Lyantonde Rural Sub Counties. The project A section of participants at the Day of African Child led to:

- community vigilance in monitoring and reporting child abuse cases.
- Increased working relationship among the child support providers including the police, Probation and Social Welfare Officer, Community Development Officers, Civil Society Organisations, and other relevant district and Sub County departments.
- Empowered community demanding for service delivery accountability from their leaders.
- Rights holders who are actively involved in the planning, implementation and evaluation of interventions targeting children.

RACOBAO in partnership with Lyantonde District Administration and the CSO fraternity successfully organised for the Day of African Child (DAC) in July 2017.

The day was an opportunity for duty bearers including Hon. Pauline Kyaka (the Woman MP Lyantonde district), cultural and religious leaders to be filled in by every staff on monthly basis as well as NGO representatives to listen to the issues that affect children. The issues were presented through speeches by duty bearers and poems, plays and songs by children from over 20 schools. At the end of the event some commitments to create friendly environment for children were made by duty bearers.

#### **B-3 Food security and nutrition**

On the other hand, 20 OVC households in Mpumudde and Lyakajura Sub Counties of Lyantonde district were provided with nutritious food supplements which enabled the malnourished children regain proper growth.

4 RACOBAO staff were trained in disaster risk reduction and Emergency planning and response Planning (EPRP) to be able to implement DRR activities. The 1 Week training that was organized under the act alliance was facilitated by (PDR) in partnership with ICCO Cooperation . Following the training RACOBAO is in process of incorporating DRR in all its policies and programs and will implement 2 projects 1 in West Nile and another in Rwamwanja Refugee settlement in Kamwenge District in 2017 with support from Finn Church Aid and the Women's Bank.

## C- Governance, Management and Institutional Development

#### C.1: Board of Directors

RACOBAO's executive board continued providing strategic direction to the organization. For the first time since inception of RACOBAO, the board was fully constituted. The board held 2 meetings during which 5 policies developed with technical support from PATH under the ABH project were approved. The board members held a joint field visit to assess the relevance, effectiveness and efficiency of RACOBAO interventions and thereafter gave recommendations.
